About Missouri State University

Missouri State University was founded in 1905 as the Fourth District Normal School. During its early years, the institution's primary purpose was preparing teachers for the public school systems in the southwest region of Missouri.

With more than 24,000 students, Missouri State University is the second largest university in the state with six academic colleges, one School of Agriculture, and one Graduate College.

Missouri State University is a public, comprehensive metropolitan system with a statewide mission in public affairs, whose purpose is to develop educated persons.

The University's identity is distinguished by its public affairs mission, which entails a campus-wide commitment to foster expertise and responsibility in ethical leadership, cultural competence and community engagement.

Missouri State University students represent all 50 states and 85 foreign countries studying in one of our 85+ undergraduate majors leading to 185+ academic options or 45+ graduate degree programs.

Students participate in nearly 300 student organizations and more than 25 fraternities and sororities. Students also play about 20 intramural sports, receive more than \$150

million in financial aid with 75 percent of students receiving some form of assistance annually. In addition Missouri State University students volunteer more than 100,000 hours at government and nonprofit organizations through the Campus Volunteer Center, cooperative education, and service-learning.

The Missouri State University community includes almost 4,000 faculty and staff members with 90 percent of full-time ranked faculty holding the most advanced degree in their field, 17 NCAA Division I teams with 52 NCAA championship appearances, and more than 110,000 alumni applying their education around the world.

Academic College Highlights

College of Arts & Letters

- Animation program in the Department of Art & Design was ranked #13 in the midwest and #21 nationally by *Animation Career Review*, **the** online source for training and schooling opportunities for students aspiring to be animation, design, and gaming professionals.
- Communication Department received the 2015 Outstanding Undergraduate Communication Program Award at the Central States Communication Association (CSCA) conference.
- Three of the four undergraduate programs in the English Department are largest in the state: English Education (training high school English teachers), Technical and Professional Writing, and Creative Writing.
- Department of Media, Journalism, & Film has won more than 400 awards since becoming a department in 2001. Its most notable award is second-place Student Emmy Award for its web series *Epilogue*, a six-part, time-travel, science fiction web series, which has won 15 awards overall in national, international, and state competitions.
- Department of Modern & Classical Languages has Missouri's largest undergraduate program in Spanish Education, with a near 100 percent placement rate, and has an innovative new graduate degree, the Master of Applied Second Language Acquisition. The department and University were named 2013 Friend of Foreign Language by the Foreign Language Association of Missouri.
- Undergraduate and graduate students from Department of Music performed with Tallis Scholars, a New York City renaissance group; the Weimar Bach Scholars in Germany; and the Manhattan Opera Company.
- Alumni from Theatre & Dance have appeared in numerous network TV series, in major dance companies, and in feature films, and have worked on theatrical productions around the country, including the 2015 Tony-Award winning musical, *Fun Home*.

College of Business

- Awarded Top Area MBA program by *Ingram's Magazine* every year since 2006; made #6 on this list in 2015.
- MBA Program is recognized twice by *U.S. News and World Report*: Best Online Graduate Business Programs and Best Online Programs for Veterans.
- Among the 10 percent of U. S. business schools to have both business and accounting programs accredited by AACSB International. Only 1.6 percent of business schools worldwide have this accreditation.
- Corporate Mentor Program connects first generation and underrepresented student populations with key business leaders in the Springfield metro area.
- Ad Team won the U. S. State Department's Peer to Peer: Challenging Extremism program. After competing internationally with 21 other universities, MSU was the only U.S. team of three universities selected as finalists. This is the second consecutive win for the Ad Team and is one of five national advertising and branding competitions the team has won in the last seven years.
- Enactus team placed second in League 9 of the quarter final round of competition at Enactus National Exposition. Missouri State placed in the top 32 teams in the nation.
- Beta Alpha Psi students, the National Honorary Organization for financial information professionals, won first place at regional competition in Best Practices, sending them to compete at nationals.
- A new Master's degree in Cybersecurity will begin Fall 2015.
- Now offering a Bachelor's degree in Mechanical Engineering Technology.

College of Education

- One in eight Pre-Kindergarten – Grade 12 classrooms in Missouri is led by a Missouri State University College of Education graduate.
- A new Master's degree in Child Life will be offered soon; only three other institutions of higher education in the U. S. offer this degree.
- Two site-based degrees for career teachers include Master's in Teaching & Learning and Specialist in Teacher Leadership.
- Home to the Missouri Institute for Leadership in Education (MILE) program for school principals and superintendents.
- The Missouri Leadership for Excellence, Achievement, and Development (MoLEAD) is expanding its program to include a third round of training, as well as a new pilot program with Missouri State University aimed at enhancing instructional leadership among school administrators.
- Establishment of a regional assistive technology demonstration project, in which MSU faculty and staff demonstrate technologies such as augmentative and alternative communication, low vision and Braille devices, screen readers, mobility aids and other assistive equipment. This project is a partnership with the Missouri Assistive Technology Council and area agencies such as the Springfield R-12 Public Schools and the Southwest Center for Independent Living.
- Developed the Hispanic Initiatives Program (HIP). The purpose of HIP is to bridge the MSU campus community with Hispanic communities of the Southwest Missouri area as well as bridge the Hispanic communities of Southwest Missouri with community organizations and institutions that serve and are reaching out to this population.

College of Health & Human Services

- Students within the College of Health and Human Services collectively contribute more than 22,000 hours of community service each year.
- Degree programs utilize an interprofessional approach to education, emphasizing the importance of working across disciplines to provide quality care to patients and clients.
- CHHS students have been awarded the prestigious Missouri State University Citizen Scholar Award, which recognizes achievements in leadership, service, and academics.
- The College of Health and Human Services is home to many accredited undergraduate and graduate programs.
- The new Master's degree in Occupational Therapy will begin in fall 2015; only one other public institution in the state offers this degree program.
- CHHS students gain extensive hands-on experience in their fields of study by participating in specialized laboratory exercises, internships, practica, directed research, and professional clinical rotations.

College of Humanities & Public Affairs

- 7th Annual Missouri State University Criminology and Criminal Justice Conference included more than 30 panel presentations, two workshops, two keynote speakers, and more than 25 agencies participating in a career/employment fair.
- Alumna Lieutenant General Karen E. Dyson made U.S. Army history by becoming the first female Finance Officer to achieve the three-star rank.
- Grant received to investigate the role of HUMAID, a non-governmental organization (NGO) in the campaign to clear Guinea Bissau (West Africa) of landmines and unexploded ordnance (UXO).
- A team of ten Department of Defense and Strategic Studies graduate students took part in an international strategic crisis negotiation exercise, held in Washington, D. C., administered by the U. S. Army War College, and hosted by the Center for Strategic and International Studies.
- Philosophy Professor, Dr. Johnny Washington, serves on Missouri Bar Association's Citizen Advisory Task Force.
- Faculty and student participated in the American Model United Nations (AMUN) Conference in Chicago and the Midwest Model United Nations Conference in St. Louis.
- Department of Religious Studies hosted a Religions in South Asia Conference.
- Faculty and students traveled to Bluefields, Jamaica, to conduct archaeological excavations with the Bluefields Peoples' Community Association (BPCA).
- Center for Archaeological Research (CAR) conducts archaeological field work and other cultural resource management projects on a contractual basis.
- Center for Social Science and Public Policy Research (CSSPPR) offers survey research services for faculty, university agencies, and community groups. CSSPPR specializes in various forms of survey research, including public opinion polling.

College of Natural & Applied Sciences

- Recently awarded grants include two Improving Teacher Quality Grants: Science, Technology, and Engineering for Elementary Educators, Integrating Literacy (STEEL) and Getting it Write in Math. Both grants are through the U. S. Department of Education and Missouri Department of Higher Education (MDHE).
- Contracted with Phigenics LLC to test water for legionell.
- Monitored vital signs of natural resources in 15 units through the National Park Service.
- Contract with Lake of the Ozarks Council of Local Governments to assemble key stakeholders and success stories lists for U. S. Environmental Protection Agency project
- Received award for the propagation and captive culture of freshwater mussels for Ohio River restoration through the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

School of Agriculture

- Dr. Anson Elliott, director of the William H. Darr School of Agriculture, received \$30,295 from the U. S. Department of Agriculture to fund an expansion of the graduate programs in order to meet employment demands.
- The Darr School of Agriculture hosted the 17th Annual Collegiate Farm Bureau Agricultural Forum, which included keynote speakers, Senator Roy Blunt, Congressman Billy Long, and Missouri Farm Bureau President Blake Hurst.
- In the American Stock Horse Association National Collegiate Championship, the MSU Ranch Horse team took third place, placing behind Texas A&M University and Texas Tech University.
